

## ***HORTICULTURE HAIKU !***

Haiku is a form of poetry that originated in Japan over 300 years ago. A Haiku poem is very short set of words that often expresses a unique thought or feeling. It is a short poem that records the essence of a moment keenly perceived in which Nature is linked to human nature.

Although slight variations are acceptable, the typical Haiku poem consist of 17 syllables in the standard format shown below:

Line one: 5 syllables  
Line two: 7 syllables  
Line three: 5 syllables

*A seed is near me  
unafraid to germinate  
and start a new life.*

A haiku can be anywhere from a few to 17 syllables, rarely more. It may or may not necessarily match subject to verb for a complete sentence as you have been taught in grammar. Haiku lends itself to experimentation with language.

Very often Haiku poetry addresses a Nature topic. Consider the haiku poem a very small slice of life that expresses a thought or a feeling in a very concise manner. See examples:

*A cloud above my head (5)  
Is destined to remember (7)  
All the things I said. (5)*

*Horticulture rocks. (5)  
or at least that's what they say. (7)  
I think they were right. (5)*

*Osmocote grows plants (5)  
Better than I ever knew.(7)  
I better get some. (5)*

*Underneath the node.(5)  
is where the roots will emerge. (7)  
If you use root hormone. (6)*

And some different versions of Haiku...

*Beach parking lot  
Where the door opened  
A small pile of sand.*

*Since my house burned down  
I now own a better view  
Of the rising moon.*

*Sitting in the sun,  
In the middle of the plants  
That I just watered.*

*Wispy autumn clouds  
in the river shallows.  
The droppings of a deer.*

## ***HORTICULTURE HAIKU!***

- **SINCE IT IS A BEAUTIFUL DAY TODAY, THIS ASSIGNMENT WILL BE OUTDOORS.**
